

Our Annual General Meeting points the way ahead

In up-coming months the Forum will be working out a programme based on our objectives to:

- Reach out and promote the welfare of Islington's pensioners;
- Recruit new members into the Forum and extend our influence:
- Work with other likeminded groups to unite the generations;
- Build our connections with other North London pensioner groups.

This programme is based on experiences over past years and particularly since the last AGM. Our report showed this.

On our relations with Islington Council, the importance of the various Council events, the

reports from Councillors poverty, from caring to and the warmth of the Mayor's hospitality have all given the Forum great confidence that we can share our experiences and concerns with the Councillors to promote the welfare of Islington's pensioners. This is particularly important at a time when the Council already suffered £112m cuts in government funding with the expectation of a further £95m of cuts.

When we together in our report the very varied subjects and speakers at our monthly meetings we were surprised - and we managed to have a general election hustings as well. From the NHS to fuel

to our monthly meetings transport our members heard from and discussed with experts.

> Also during the year we campaigned: successfully on a 50% reduction in visitors' day parking passes, but unsuccessfully to keep our post offices; and we are part of on-going actions with the Whittington Hospital Coalition, and on the NPC national campaign for the Dignity Code - but on this we are fortunate to have a Council which has brought adopted the Dignity Code at the heart of its annual care workers' awards.

> > Our monthly newsletter importantly gives information on pensions, health and care etc, guides our campaigns and reports on these as well as our

social activities and our reducing loneliness and isolation initiative. Thanks to grant aid from the Council and the decision to have the £5 a year membership subscription (producing and distributing our newsletter costs £8 per member per vear) our AGM was able to decide to continue this newsletter and to produce a quarterly publication based on our



WE'RE NEVER TOO OLD TO ORGANISE... ... AGITATE.... AND FIGHT BACK!

The result of the General Election -- a majority Tory government -- was a very bad result for pensioners.

Everyone including the Tories expected a hung-parliament leading to a minority or coalition government. Indeed my view is that the Tories published a manifesto which they did not anticipate having to fulfil. Their

thinking was that, if after the election they were to either form a minority government or be part of a coalition government, they could hold up their hands saying that they were being prevented from carrying

out their manifesto in full because of opposition from other Parties. However this is not the case. Regardless of the outcome of the election there were going to be cuts. The issue at hand was how severe they were going to be. We now know that they are going to be very severe indeed.

The Tories have stated they intend to impose £12billions of welfare cuts. Therefore to

achieve this level of cuts they will have to adopt a "slash and burn" policy. If allowed to get away with this the impact on Local Authority jobs and services will be horrendous. The impact on the National Health Service will be equally bad. This must lead to a great deterioration in the services and support for pensioners.

Now that they have been elected the Tories are moving even more to the right. The cuts that'll be proposed will be much more severe than those we have already suffered from. It will be the working class who will again be expected to pay for the financial mess that was none of their doing.

- Jobs will be cut:
- living standards will fall;
- benefits will be cut:
- the vulnerable will become more vulnerable;
- there will be an increased use of food banks and cuts in services which will adversely affect those that rely on them such as the elderly, the disabled etc.

Unimaginable though it may be it has even been suggested that the Tories could consider cuts that

One just needs to look at the recent budget to see this scenario unfolding in front of our eyes.

We pensioners are already about to suffer a discriminatory state pension

scheme whereby those who retire from 2016 onwards will have a larger pension than us who have already retired, but as time goes on people will have to work longer, pay more but get a lower pension

than us! So we must unite with future pensioners to campaign for a living state pension -- above the poverty level.

We must also look to protecting Universal Benefits as the Tories will be looking to either reduce them or, where they think they can, eliminate them.

We must also fight for a much increased Winter Fuel Allowance given the high energy prices we

are faced with as the energy companies go for everincreasing profits. It is appalling that 31,000 pensioners died of cold-related diseases in 2013/14 which could have been avoided if they had sufficient money to pay for gas/electricity to keep warm. We must stop the dreadful situation where the majority of pensioners have to choose between heating their homes or buying food.

The Tories' cuts in the welfare system will have an adverse effect on all of us. They want to slash the welfare system leaving vulnerable people of all ages even more vulnerable and those who are possibly just keeping their heads above water going under.

These are just a number of the issues that will be affecting pensioners over the next months and years. It is important that we fight for our rights and defend what we've got through the various pensioners/older persons' organisations such as local Pensioners Forums and UNISON's Retired Members Groups as well as nationally with the National Pensioners Convention.

CONTROLLED PARKING ZONES

Islington Council propose to extend controlled parking zones (CPZs) in the following areas:

- ANGEL: parking will be restricted between 8.30 am and 11 pm seven days a week
- EMIRATES STADIUM CONTROL AREA: this includes Highbury, Canonbury, Finsbury Park and large parts of Holloway, existing match-day controls will be removed and the parking restrictions extended to 9 pm, seven days a week.
- AROUND FINSBURY SQUARE AND FARRING-DON STATION: the CPZ will apply for 24 hours between Monday and Saturday and from midnight to 6am on Sundays.
- AROUND WHITTINGTON HOSPITAL: the CPZ will be in force 24 hours a day, seven days a week
- ARCHWAY: the zone will be extended to 8.30 am to 6.30 pm from Monday to Friday and from 8.30 am to 1.30 pm on Saturdays.

They propose a £2.40 flat rate pay-and-display evening charge to cover the extended periods and free e-vouchers for residents' visitors to cover Monday to Saturday from 6.30 pm to 9 pm and 8.30 am to 9 pm on Sundays.

These measures are aimed at protecting parking for residents, but the traders say they will be bad for business; also changes could be a problem for frail elderly people who depend on families getting them out of the house at week-ends.

Latest figues of Pensioner Poverty:

The proportion of pensioners in relative and absolute low income (after housing costs) both increased in 2013/'4 by 1 percentage point to 14% and 16% respectively, according to the latest figures from the Department of Work and pensions (DWP). These figures show 1.6 million pensioners in relative low income, whilst there were 1.9 million under the absolute low income measure of 60% median population income. However, the DWP described this increase as "not statistically significant". Nevertheless, it shows that changes to pension uprating and rising living costs are having an impact on older people.

One in five patients lack dignity:

A fifth of people in hospital in England are not always treated with respect and dignity, according to a wide-ranging survey of NHS patients. It found that more than a third of patients who need help at mealtimes did not receive enough assistance. The research by the London School of Economics found 23% of patients reported experiencing poor or inconsistent standards of dignity and respect. the equivalent to 2.8 million people a year, of whom a million would be aged 65 and over. They also found that a quarter of all respondents said they needed help with eating during their hospital stay, amounting to just under 3.5 million a year.Of those who needed help with eating, 38% said they only sometimes, or never, received enough help from staff -- equivalent to 1.3 million a year, and 640,000 aged 65 and over.

Over 1m people without home care

The number of elderly people not getting help with tasks such as washing, eating and dressing has soared to more than 1 million. According to figures from Age uk, the number of older people not getting help with basic tasks has risen by 100,000 to 1.004.000 in the last ver. Some 580.000 people are not receiving support with washing or bathing, while 140,000 are without support for going to the toilet. In addition, an estimated 210,000 older people do not get any help with getting out of bed and 230,000 with taking their medication. The lack of social care is putting increased pressure on the NHS. Between 2005-06 and 2012-13, the number of over 65s admitted to A&E increased from 1,810,531 to 2,211,228. Over the same period spending on social care services for older people fell from £8.1billion to £5.46 billion.
