On 20th July we had our Annual General Meeting. Our president, Jeremy Corbyn MP took the chair for the election of our committee, and we are pleased to announce the election of five new members. The first committee meeting was on Monday 7th August, and the officers and other responsibilities were decided. The full list is on page two.

Elaine Durack gave the Annual Report:

Welcome to our AGM, and thank you all for coming.

Firstly, we would like to thank Islington Counci for their continued support with funding, which has enabled us to keep going over many years, and especially the excellent Voluntary and Community Sector Development Team.

Following lockdown members who were not on the committee were invited to come to its meetings, and I accepted the invitation. After that, at last year's AGM I was elected to the committee and became secretary. I am proud of that — to be able to keep the flag flying just as George did for all those years. We are now encouraging other members to come forward to join the committee to continue to build IPF.

We would like to thank Bronwen, our co-ordinator, who gave the annual report in 2022, and kept the newsletter and the web site going during lockdown despite having a quadruple heart bypass. Also thanks to Lydia who became the outings/events organiser just before lockdown, kept in touch all the way through the lockdowwn and has taken on more responsibilities because of Bronwen's continued ill-health. Also thanks to Mohammad who retired from his accountancy

services to IPF, but raised the money for the film club and will be taking responsibility for that starting on Tuesday 25th July. (see box on page 2)

It was Jeremy's 40th anniversary as Islington North's MP recently, and we have a presentation to make to mark this. We thank him for standing up for IPF and for the whole community in the borough, with kindness and in a completely inclusive way.

In remembering George, we also remembered his warning about the way Jeremy was badly treated by the press and some of his so-called colleagues, and how, in our newsletter we have used a picture of George and a group of IPF members displaying a banner in 2017 telling the press to stop their unfair and unfounded abuse of Jeremy.

A few months ago, IPF was invited to send a delegation to the Council's "Dignity in Social Care" awards ceremony. This was a very moving and uplifting event.

I can report that myself and Frances are our delegates to the London Region of the National Pensioners Convention and hopefully we will be attending its regional meetings in the coming year and build contacts with other pensioner groups in London.



Letter....

Trapped by traditional capitalist ideas!

Taking steps to tackle climate change is often seen as a luxury, but the people who will be hardest hit by rising global temperatures are the people with the least resources and resilience, which of course includes us as elders.

People can avoid eating beef and dairy products, stop using private cars and take public transport or walk, but the single most effective action we can possibly take is to vote for political parties whose policies are aimed at addressing the climate crisis and averting human catastrophe.

Only policy change can bring about the scale of change that is needed, for example to effect a tenfold reduction in CO2 emissions. The gap between what science tells us about climate change and politics has widened because both left and right parties say putting green policies in their manifesto would make them unelectable.

This was illustrated recently in a serious political discussion podcast: "The Rest is Politics", where Rory Stewart and Alastair Campbell discussed the de-growth with Kate Raworth, who is famous for her "doughnut economics". Stewart and Campbell both agreed (a) that Raworth's theory was spot on, and (b) that neither the Conservatives nor Labour would enact such a policy.

Raworth says we are trapped by the traditional capitalist ideas that economic growth reduces inequality and that people are merely self-interested individuals. She points out that politicians bend to the will of corporations and elites, which have little interest in changing the status quo. She says to address the climate crisis we must think differently. Central to her "doughnut" theory is that the economy should distribute wealth fairly, regenerate the resources it uses and allow people to prosper.

We continue to work with Peter Crockett of Healthy Generations who runs the weekly IT classes —at present on-line but we are working towards holding these classes in our hall as we did before lockdown.

Also we are hoping to roll out the Hub soon. This is aimed at electronically sign-posting people to all kinds of useful and relevant services. We will also be advertising our events and updates on electronic noticeboards the Council has throughout the borough.

We know that one of the biggest concerns of older people relates to dementia and we are working closely with the Council on this issue. In April we had the Commissioning Manager for Islington's "Age Well" team, Sophia Stevens as a guest speaker, but mainly asking us questions about what the Council needs to do to develop services in the "Age Well" programme.

Due to government austerity cuts to Council funding, 65 per cent of dementia patients are in care homes outside of the borough. The Council team is therefore working with us on the needs of people with dementia, as well as those with other disabilities and needing assistance with shopping and companionship.

In March we had Councillor Janet Burgess explaining her responsibilities as the Council's EC member for adult social care for the last ten years. She says she is now taking a back seat, but we wanted to acknowledge the terrific leadership she has provided in standing up for the rights of older and disabled people and their carers.

She said that across the country Islington is the fifth borough with the most deprived pensioners. Islington Council has ensured the living wage for carers and payment of travel time to be included

We continue to work with Peter Crockett of in the Council's contracts for home care workers. Healthy Generations who runs the weekly IT Rightly so!

Another concern for older people is digital exclusion — leading to islolation. For example, train tickets only being available on-line — exacerbated at a time when there are threats to close many ticket offices.

It should always be remembered that we are a key campaigning organisation in Islington uniting and standing up for the rifghts of older people. Islington Pensioners Forum is a non-party political organisation, but we do stand up for the basic rights of pensioners. That's why we are proud to have Jeremy Corbyn as our president, and we thank him for his continued support.

Our monthly newsletter is distributed to nearly 400 members, informing them of our campaigns, including the social care crisis, concern over lack of funding for the NHS and the levels of the state pension.

While appreciating the grant we get from the Council, in order for our organisatrion to continue to thrive and offer social activities for our members we need to explore other fund-raising avenues.

Finally, after a long delay because of the lock-down, we are pleased to say that the memorial to George Durack, the long time chair of IPF, was unveiled on 1st July in Navigator Square, Archway. George died, aged 94, in September 2018. Jeremy Corbyn was the guest speaker, along with the Mayor, Gary Heather. The memorial consists of a beautifully designed chess table and chairs next to the Archway Tavern, and bears a plaque to recognise George's contribution to the IPF, local services and his work in the trade union movement.

STOP THE CLOSURE OF RAILWAY TICKET OFFICES!

The consultation into the plan to close hundreds of ticket offices in England has been extended until 1 September. Organisers of the consultation said some train companies did not provide accessible formats, preventing people from being able to respond to plans. Even so, more than 170,000 responses have been received, according to watchdogs Transport Focus and London TravelWatch. The plan sparked concern from rail unions and disability groups over accessibility issues. In a discussion on this important issue, our A.G.M. decided to call on members and curporters to join together on Thursday 17th August at Finshury Park Station to

supporters to join together on Thursday 17th August at Finsbury Park Station to make a stand. Just like "driver only trains" this proposal is another step towards cutting jobs and leaving elderly and disabled people without proper support to get their tickets and to travel safely.
